DECK 4

The stairs for evacuating the crew after an emergency landing via the hatch on Deck 2 start on this deck. Around, behind, and beneath these stairs is a storage space (EL).

TMoST mentions that Water Storage is on Deck 7. Of course, water can be placed there too, but the shallow space around this deck lends itself well to this function.

Most of the Crew's Quarters in the Primary Hull are laid out in rings. The rings are labeled from the center outwards, starting with A, then B, then C, and so on.

TMoST mentions Junior Officers have quarters on Deck 4. There are sufficient accommodations in the Primary Hull for the crew complement of this type of Destroyer. Crew members do not have to share quarters with anyone else.

DECK 4 DORSAL

A connection exists between Deck 4 and Deck 4 DORSAL, but the ceiling is too low for full access. Therefore, the Piping / Wiring Trunk occupies this space. Further aft, there are ladders, stairs and an elevator.

This is a lounge.

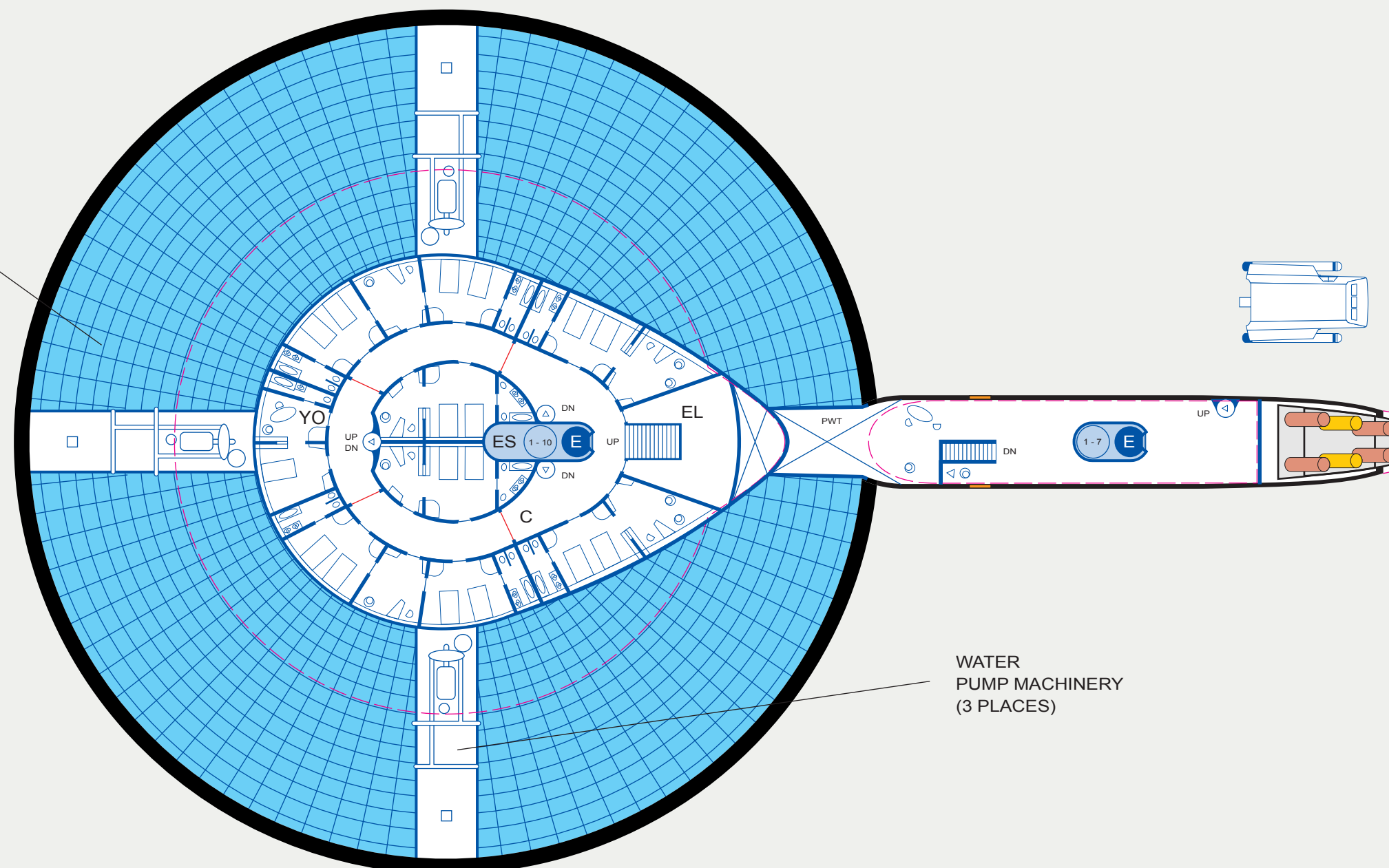
The shuttlecraft is shown here to demonstrate how narrow the dorsal decks are. A Hangar Bay simply cannot fit.
