this. ANYTHING CAN HAPPEN!



It appears that the single, "Dreamline" has been released in some parts of the country (Boston seems to be the first!) way before the actual release date of August 12th! Some heard Dreamline 7-10 days before Atlantic released it! The station in Boston was reportedly scolded by Atlantic to some degree - but its really hard to blame them for playing it. 
has got to be done to bring this out of bounds pricing structure down to earth!!) It really must start at square one - the initial seller....otherwise we all get the shaft.





Rush are good friends of mine in that they put out music I can care enough to buy and praise. But I know now that it is simply cause and effect; it is provoked! It is not Love.





Roll The Bones Review Part 2

The Men: Neil sez, "We're Psyched!" Slarty Bardfarst sez, "Hey, they're just these guys, ya know?" Fabulously humble integreticians. Musicians. Magicians. Power-chord philosophers.

Men of spirit and purpose. Alex sez, "Yea, its a pretty good job." Zip sez, "Yow!" Truth seekers.

Heat seekers. And for fertile growth conditions and strong roots, Peat seekers. (You know, the sixties folk-meister). Objectivists, humanists, realists, pragmatic idealists. Geddy sez, "We hope to make that timeless album someday." Timeless indeed!

The Music: Hip-Hop Lite-pop metalists. Roll the Bones once again confirms the bands conviction to musicality and dynamics. The textures that were once a Rush trademark have returned. Gone are the sterile days of cold digitally synthesized musicscapes. Gone are the two-dimensional musical paintings, colorful and vivid though they were. Back is the tone, the depth, the space, the air on the strings. As Geddy tempers his voice down into a comfortable range, the songs are easier to singalong with. This ability of the listener to pseudo-participate generates a warmth and a connection to the music and the message. Subtlety is still ever present. Seemingly seamless and simple melodies are played with the confidence and quality that only true masters can produce. There is much more going on than a first listen usually reveals. Every listen exposes a new angle and illuminates a different facet of each piece. Chords that build high like a mountain, and notes that fall gently like rain...

The Mission: One wonders about the increased use of song titles within the lyrics of the songs on *Roll the Bones*. With many artists this would be an obvious tactic to improve consumer recognition. Rush has to eat and buy new instruments once in a while too, you know. It's hard to blame them. Still it can be slightly worrysome. Beyond the superficial, though, *Roll the Bones* is about life. The chaos and yearning of youth. The seeking of fame, fortune and adventure. Pride. Love. Anger. Hope. Compassion. Uncertainty. Faith. Growing old. Destiny. It's all there. Life is an unpredictable crap-shoot. Fear and timidity will only smother you with complacency. Hope and hard work at the conjuncture of opportunity produce good luck. If Rush's mission is to sell their music and their message, they are selling top shelf goods. And yes, it is timeless and about time.

"Armchair rocket scientist graffiti existentialist"

("I am not an existentialist; I am a free man!"*)

"The Odds Get Even." Death is the Ultimate Equalizer. You Bet Your Life immediately splits open your skull with a badto-the-bone tone from Alex's guitar. It's very reminicent of the sound of so many bands populating the college radio station airwaves. Interestingly, it's in college when many people do their most profound thinking about survival. And beyond mere survival, the lucky ones have time to examine and contemplate life itself. Studies journey both with-in and without the individual. And it's at this stage when a living framework or philosophy or skeletion for life is developed. This is eventually fleshed out, as experience and wisdom are acquired from living. But with so many choices, whose to know the Right Way? The chances must be taken. The choices must be made. You Bet Your Life!

Perhaps a moment to dream**: Imagine, if you will, the three faces of Alex, Geddy, and Neil on your mental video screen simultaneously lip-syncing the words to the "Life" chant. Now duplicate these faces maybe a hundred times or so to fill the entire visual plane. (If you're a 3-D thinker, try filling the depth with all these simultaneously chanting heads.)

"deconstruction primitive performance photo-realist"

Sprinkle in a few extra faces of the timeless sages, say, Plato, Aristotle, Jung, Neitsche, (God?), and have them join in on the lip-synced chant. Add chromatic oscillations to the background and begin a slow linear motion of all the repeated heads. (Try right to left motion.) Yow!

Slowly Pan back so that instead of hundreds, there are now thousands of these chanting heads in view. With this new perspective, the linear motion is seen to be curved, like the surface of a rotating cylinder. The heads come from afar on the right, pass in the nearfield at the center, and dissapear into the vast eternal void again on the left.

Continue to pan back to see that the moving faces are traveling along the surfaces of Neil's drum bodies. The perspective widens still to encompass the complete drum kit and then the entire stage to see all three again (Alex, Geddy, and Neil) performing You Bet Your Life in concert...

As many heads as there are on this planet Earth, there are equally as many combinations, permutations, and scintillations of the View of Life. Could it be that we all have the same destiny anyway? Could it be that we are all saying the same thing in zillions of different ways?

The process of maturation is one of the most amazing and incomprehensible forms of growth. It exists in everything, saplings into trees, gaseous interstellar stuff into stars and sometimes even boys into men.

The process takes a lifetime. The day that we, as the newborn, first open our eyes is the first step into physical maturation; as is the day we begin to walk, our first word, puberty, and that first grey hair or wrinkle. Our first memory is systematic of the arrival of mental and personal maturity. The gaining of knowledge furthers our intellectual maturity, the gaining of experience, our personal maturity. We continue to grow as long as we function. And with growth comes change. Thus as with our environment, we are ever changing. After all, change changes aren't permanent, the change is.

If people could change individually then so can a single group acting as a single entity — such as a band. Rush has matured as much or more as any single sole entity.

When we take out first step, we falter and fall. When Rush played their first gigs, they were, by there own assessment, pretty bad. But keep walking and soon you're running. Maybe you don't know where your running, but at least you're in motion. Rush kept playing, kept practicing, kept running and they ran into a few gigs along the way. They got attention, just like anyone running down the hall would.

In time you grow taller, you gain your balance and you learn how to combine the art of walking and running, as well as how to skip and gallop. Rush did their first set of albums and began to etch a place for them in the track of the music world. Sometimes they ran, sometimes they walked and sometimes they would wind up flat on their face — but like anyone, they would get right up and walk again.

Style eventually comes into play — you learn how to saunter, how to cruise pass the chicks by the lockers, how to impress the guys and how to scare your parents. Rush learned stye as well, deciding what they wanted to be and how to become that.

Soon you join the freshman track team. Your not quite running with the big boys, but you're running near them. Don't forget that the coach is watching — and that the world is listening. Then one day you win the big race and that's it — your in the **BIG TIME**. Your running cross country now, being nominated for Junos and Grammies. People know your name.

Finally after years of hard work and learning how to run, you become a marathon torch runner in the Olympics. You've reached IT. Your performing before thousands and thousands of people and not only do people know your name, they inexplicably now want you to write it on papers that bear your semblance, various objects with your names, pieces of plywood and assorted body parts. Young men worship you and



blond women want to marry you.

Yes, you've matured, your grown and all your hard work coupled with that has payed off. But the final test of your maturity comes not in your achievement, but how you react to it. Are you arrogant and hotly? Do you loom it over the heads of your former cruel and snobby classmates who are now working for Burger King? Do you blow your new found wealth on frivolous things or meary be satisfied that you'll never have to worry about money again? Do you have Grace Under Pressure?

Rush does without a doubt. They've had to work at it I'm sure, but they've handled themselves with tact, grace, decorum, humor and maturity. "But suddenly it's all different-all at once it seems obvious that we have a long creative partnership ahead of us. Maybe we're growing up a tiny bit; I'm not sure; but I do know that we are excited about this band in a whole new way. Each of us feels it, and Roll the Bones was the catalyst - this record was so enjoyable to make, and the process was so satisfying through each of its stages that suddenly we feel a new conviction, a sense of rebirth.

Comments from ASOF Fan Survey 1991 Number Eight, on the "experience" of Rush:

Rush's evolution pretty much parallels my personal evolution. Their music help me see the forest through the trees.

Rush is significant to my listening pleasure in many, many ways. A first is the emotive, powerful quality of the delivery of their musical art. Strong, rhythmic quality. Second is a visual quality. This quality transcends images inspired by the lyrics. It is a difficult thing to describe, but the musical tones, rhythms and nuances allow me to visualize movements and transitions with startling clarity and depth. Few other bands can induce this sensation so consistently. A natural high.

Lyrically, the stories & messages are clear and entertaining. Thankfully, there is no "boy meets girl" etc... ad nauseam (love is covered tastefully, not tactfully). Strong value statements are made which I agree with: honesty, integrity, change for growth, learn, hope for the best and hold on to humor with high regard. Seek wisdom without pretentious, avoid complacency etc.

The live performance of Rush has attained a level which is rarely equaled by any other performers in arena rock. (simply awe inspiring

And finally, the members of Rush aren't your average bonehead rockers. They're genuine people with a concern for others. Charismatic without being phony. They seem to remember who the friends are.



Well, in 1990, I wanted it to be something a little more special. I agonized over what sort of a sign to do. Inspiration struck. A painting-on canvas. What to paint? There's so much. Maybe a collage of all the album covers. But how to arrange them? Again, I agonized. Then, one night it came to me, in a dream. I sat up in bed, my heart racing. It was beautiful-absolutely perfect. I went out and bought canvas (ever try to find 6' wide canvas?) and brushes and paints. I had so much fun. Then I stood there and wondered, looking at the bare canvas, how do I get the vision in my head onto this canvas. I had never painted before. But I had a desire, very strong and a vision burning in my heart and mind. See, these guys have been with me for a long time. I've grown up with them. They've



The painting was completed just before I was to go see them in San Diego on the 5th of April, 1990. I unrolled it on the living room floor and stood back to take a look at my masterpiece. Tears rolled down my face. I felt so empty inside. It hurt like hell. I thought to myself "what have I done?" I put everything I had into that painting. Half of my life, all my hopes and dreams, sorrows and joys, everything they have ever made me feel and everything I've ever felt about them. My



I photographed it and put it on t-shirts and did all sorts of stuff then I went to see the show in San Diego. It was incredible. Me, being emotional about these things, cried. I hung around after the show to speak with Jack Secret and gave him a picture of the painting. I brought the painting to my second show in Phoenix on the 8th. Rush arrived and Jimmy Johnson came out to get my painting to take back to them. He brought it back to me a few minutes later and told me they thought it was beautiful and they wrote messages to me on it. We got the painting and immediately unrolled it to see what they had written. I turned suddenly to see at least 50 people crowding around us. And there at the bottom-their words and signatures. I busted out crying like a baby. It all came rushing back (no pun intended). All those years. (Not wasted ones either.) All the love, the music, the devotion and now recognition! They appreciated my work. I made them smile. So I stood there and drenched my brother's shoulder. After this, I was given a pair of Neil's sticks (personally bruised by the Professor himself) and a handful of Alex's guitar picks. I thoroughly enjoyed the show that evening. I had very mixed emotions on the way home. I was happy yet sad at the same time. Here, I had given my best, did all I could, and still hadn't met them. Yet, at the same time, they did recognize me. I got something from them. I think I cried the whole way home. I thought it was over then but gladly, I was wrong. I was asked to photograph my cousin's wedding in the middle of June around the Chicago area. Lo and behold - who should happen to be on tour in the area at the same time? One guess. Rush at Alpine Valley. Yes!! I extended my trip by a day and headed out for the show. I sent word that Mandy, the painter, was there. Jack Secret came down to meet me and said, "You're a long way from home. Let me see what I can do." Forty-five minutes later he comes back with a guest pass. Yes!!! Backstage I got to meet Geddy. (I also met BC Brandt there and contrary to what was written in ASOF #1, I am not going to marry the guitarist for Mr. Big!) He was standing there so I walked up and introduced myself. He says, "Oh yes, you're the painter! You did a very nice job on that painting. We really appreciate it. I'm very pleased to meet you." He's pleased to meet me? I've been waiting my whole life for this moment and he actually remembered my name from two months prior. I stood there unable to remember a damn thing I ever wanted to say to the man. We had a wonderful conversation none the less and ended it saying "See you in Irvine!" A couple weeks later I flew out to California for the last show of the Presto tour at Irvine Meadows. This time I got an Access All Areas pass and was not only able to meet all of them but actually walk around the stage, check out all the equipment (I nearly drooled on Geddy's Wal), and witness the soundcheck (more on this in another story). What can I say? It was another evening of Rush magic. Presto!


