



Rush has evolved into one of the most underrated supergroups of the seventies and eighties. They have gone through one personnel change that altered Rush's music and lyrics into a sphere of music that is a meaningful, thought provoking, progressive type of music. In my opinion, Rush is what every musical group should strive to be at their peak of playing ability and ingenious lyric writing. There is so much energy conveyed in Rush's music that you never get tired of it at all. Thank God Rush has not and will never be one of those groups whose sole intention in writing music is to sell records. Rush's whole attitude toward that subject is "So what if we sell records. If we do, great! If we don't, well we tried something new; explored an entire new area of music. Now lets try to improve on this one."

These categories have included fusion, pop, eclectic rock, in the old days heavy metal, and even today called pompous rock "utterly contrived just so the musicians can show off." What do they want!? Rush to say "we'll try on the next album to put a little less effort into it and make some money".

There is only one way to place Rush into any musical genre whatsoever. The one category that I thought of I believe is the only way. How about just plain







Alex, Geddy, and Neil have changed greatly in appearance. They have passed from the white robes of 2112 to the short-sleeve sportcoats of Hold Your Fire. Neil started out with the curly-ended mustache and long hair and today sports the button-down, short hair, (at one time a pony tail), and we don't see the mustache very often anymore.

Geddy started in Rush with the seventies style long straight hair, and the bell-bottom jeans. Today Geddy has the leather Levi's and the extended pony tail.

Alex, who is believed to not be an original blond, has gone from straight blond hair, to wavy brownish hair, and then to short blond hair.

Take a look for yourself. Hey!
I think Geddy's nose has gotten
smaller over the years! What do
you think?








Rush has changed ever so much in the past 14 years. We have seen everything from science-fiction metal to the MIDI metal of today. We've heard lyrics ranging from "Hey baby it's a quarter to eight, I feel I'm in the mood", to more elaborate lyrical excursions such as "The pilot of Enola Gay, flying out of the shockwave, on that August day—All the powers that be, and the course of history, would be changed forevermore." That is a very visible difference.

Speaking of visible differences, Rush's album covers have improved greatly over the years. Take a look at the pictures at the left. Rush's cover art graphics by Hugh Syme have turned into works of art. He has gone from the basic owl on "Fly By Night" to the symbolic cover on the 1984 release "Grace Under Pressure" in which the upper turbulent half resembles pressure and the lower peaceful half resembles grace. Therefore you have "grace" under "pressure". --B.SISKIND



## Geddy:

#### BENEATH BETWEEN AND BEHIND

he early days when Rush had the metal edge are gone but not forgotten. The time in which Rush concentrated heavily on marathon, fantasy-oriented musical pieces. Fresently they have steered in the direction of the modern sound integrating keyboards with a progressive-metal rhythm. "Metamorphosis is a good word to describe this band," says Geddy. "We have developed a new outlook as far as our method of production; a way of looking at a song and feeling like we aren't restricted by any boundaries."




Int .- Are you happy with the way Rush has turned out?

Geddy- I am very happy with the point we have reached as of now and I am extremely pleased with the way we are making records now.

Int .- When did the modernization of Rush begin?

Geddy- It began with the departure of longtime producer Terry Brown(a.k.a. Broon). It had to to be done; not out of disrespect to him, but a matter of our band falling apart. We could anticipate his input and structured around that. The making of Signals was very difficult.



we were so close to Terry; he was practically in the band.


Int.- If you were so close to him, why did you get rid of him?

Geddy- He was just not objective anymore.

We needed someone with new ideas and
a new point of view to put out things
in our music that were not growing
as rapidly as we would like; ways of
writing songs that maybe we had not
thought of using.

Int.- Do you believe that dropping Terry
was a wise decision?

#### Geddy Lee Interview cont'd


Geddy- Yes. I think we are growing in leaps and bounds. It shows on the sound of the new record. It has been a maturing process. Grace Under Pressure was a difficult record to make; when we left Terry we were babes in the producing world.

Int.- How did you go about hiring Peter
Henderson?

Geddy- Since we really did not find who we were looking for we had to do with what was available. We had to hire Peter; he was the closest to objective that we could find. Peter worked hard and gave 150 percent, but at the end we were left feeling cheated.

Int .- What happened then? Did you keep him?

Geddy- No. After this wrenching experience we hired Feter Collins. At





least with him our expectations were more realistic.
Peter's priorities were all the necessary priorities; song structure, arrangement, objectiveness; that classical style of production.

Int.- Have you ever been
 influenced by any par ticular band?

Geddy- No. We really have not been influenced by any band but we have mixed a few lyrical references.

Int.- What authors has Rush's lyrics been refered to? cont'd

"Probably one of the purest moments of satisfaction a person can have is when you've created something out of nothing. That particular moment is inspiring..."





#### Geddy Lee Int. Cont'd

Geddy- Shakespeare, Hemingway, Fitzgerald;
When we look for influences, we look for those that are
tried and true as opposed to trendy. I think there are certain things about the classical form that have worked for a
certain reason. I like to think of our music as being orchestrated rather than simply arranged. We've always leaned towards a more bombastic classical sound, the dramatics of it
appeal to me.

Int.- On "Time Stand Still" you added Aimee Mann to the vocals on the chorus. Why did you use Aimee?

Geddy- We knew that the part she sings on was a feminine part. We didn't want to use a keyboard or have Alex or myself sing it, so we started looking for a female singer. It's a very attractive opportunity for us to work with a female singer. We just looked until we found a voice that was suitable. In listening to Aimee's last record, we loved the way she sang, so we just asked her.

Int.- Is this likely to become a trend?

Geddy- I'd doubt it, but you never know.

It depends on the material. I'm glad to say we don't feel uncomfortable making those decisions.

If we feel a song can benefit by putting a 30 piece string section on it, then we do it. The same thing goes for having a choir, or a brass band or female singer or whatever it is. I think thats really healthy for us because it's making us look at our songs in a more objective light, not with a



preconcieved notion of what a Rush song is supposed to be. We've eliminated that look at production.



#### Geddy Lee Int. Cont'd

Int .- How did you come up with "Force Ten"?



Geddy- We got the lyrics from Pye Dubois and they really stood out to Neil. He played with it a bit until he was happy with the result and showed it to us. At the time, we had nine songs and wanted to get ten tracks on the record. Peter felt we really needed one more rock song, so when these lyrics came by, we were excited about it.

Int.- How long did it take to write
 "Force Ten"?

Geddy- We wrote it one afternoon in three hours.

Int.- How do you feel about those songs that you wrote so quickly such as "Natural Science", "Vital Signs", and "New World Man"?

Geddy- Those songs to me are my favorite because they are spontaneous and fresh. It gives the album more variety and balance.

Int. There are several themes discussed on "Hold Your Fire".
What is the meaning behind the song "Mission"?

Geddy- It basically grew out of a conversation Neil and I had about the kind of people we consider ourselves to be, people who always knew what they wanted to do in their lives and always had this ambition and desire, tut couldn't make a choice as to what to do. It was always very clear that we had to do what we do- whether we were a success or a failure- we knew we would always play music in some way. "Mission" failure- we knew we would always play music in some way. "Mission" also looks sadly at the people who have never really been sure what they should be doing and have never had a clearcut idea where to put their creative ability to reach a final ultimate conclusion.

three helpless invaders trapped in his lair...


Brooding in his tower



#### "Live Through Power Windows"

This is a perfect example of Rush at their best live in concert. This recording sounds fantastic and is a solid 120 minutes of Rush at their best. It includes tunes from as far back as their first album. I was really surprised to hear "Witch Hunt" on this tour. this is definitely one song

where you miss the incredible backdrop screen in the backstage. Alex, Geddy, and Neil did it again. They found time to play most every song from "Power Windows" (their present album at that time) with the exeption of "Emotion Detector". YYZ was not left out by any means. As a matter of fact this was the first in which the climatic Peart drum solo appears not in the



middle of song but after
Alex's first solo. I was
quite startled when I heard the
usual drum roll in the place
of the expected solo. However
my extreme tension was soon
relieved by the sweet fluttering
sound of Neil's snare. After
the extended solo, you hear the
end of "Red Lenses" with an




overwhelming bass jam by Geddy.

Anyway, Geddy said that several Power Windows shows were recorded live for a probable album but the idea was scratched in order to continue the tradition of a live album for every four studio albums. All we can do is wait!!


At one Hold Your Fire show in Raliegh NC on January 15, an over-excited Rush fan set off a whistle rocket from around the 20th row. Obviously, it startled the band but fortunately there were no injuries suffered. But, being the caring guy he is, Alex stepped up to his rarely heard microphone and asked the crowd if everyone was alright. What a guy!!! Then they carried on with the last chorus of "The Temples of Syrinx".------

Hey! Did you know that Alex is a pilot? He has his license and he flies often.---

Ernest Hemingway, F. Scott Fitz-gerald, and William Shakespeare; you have read their books. Well, you've also heard them in an indirect way. Neil has been heavily influenced by all of these authors writings and reflects these influences in his lyric writing---

Good new s! Alex's son, who is 17, plays guitar and we may see him on the music scene in years to come. He must be pretty good because he has a fantastic teacher.--

"Force Ten"; you've all heard it and love it. It is an amazing piece of work. What's even more amazing is that this song was written in just three hours. This song, like "Vital Signs", was a final song written and recorded in a short time for what Geddy calls "a more spontaneous effect".---

Geddy says that Rush was considering adding an additional band member for live shows. He said it would simplify things a great deal.---

Led Zeppelin; another supergroup of the seventies. Jimmy Page, their guitarist, stated after the demise of Zeppelin that the best heavy metal band of the eighties is Rush. This was said in the book "Hammer of the Gods". The only thing wrong with this book is that the author stated that Rush was a "dreaded Canadian group". What does he know?!




